What a wonderful month September has been so far. Clivia miniata are now in full bloom in most parts of Melbourne and surrounding areas, with some plants having finished flowering already and others perhaps about to start. A few interspecifics may be in flower and buds on C. nobilis or C. caulescens may also appear over the next couple of months.

It is most exciting to see one's own crosses flowering for the first time, after a wait of five or so years. Like some other members of our group, I also have seed that was ordered from overseas coming into flower, and while some of it is not very exciting, the odd "gem" definitely makes it worthwhile. But most of all, I love to see my own crosses coming into flower.

The MCG welcomes in particular Shigetaka Sasaki, our first overseas member. Shige (for short) is an active young Japanese clivia grower who is also very knowledgeable about clivia. He has promised to send some Japanese clivia seed to members in time for distribution when we resume our meetings in February next year.

At least three members of the MCG visited Toowoomba at the end of last week to see the clivia shows there. As usual, we were able to feast on the many magnificent clivias exhibited at both shows.

The committee hopes that many of you will attend our next meeting on 17th October where we will seek members' approval to proceed with incorporation of the group. In the meantime, we will apply for affiliation with the RHSV, as agreed to at the last meeting.

We also invite you to think about what sort of function you would like us to organise in early December. An inexpensive meal somewhere or a picnic in a public garden has been suggested. Planning for next year is also on the mind of the committee and we would be pleased to hear from members about some of the topics that you would like us to cover.

The topics for the next meeting are ones of importance. Lisa Fox will introduce the topic of Colour Inheritance, and we will also briefly discuss the growing of seedlings. In addition to any pots of clivias, please also do bring along some questions that you would like answered by the group. We look forward to a large gathering of clivia enthusiasts on 17 October.

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Notes from the Observing Clivia miniata discussion

These notes have been prepared by Helen Marriott and are a summary of Helen's discussion on Clivia miniata – characteristics and variations.

Here is a simplified check list to help us observe various features of the Clivia miniata plants that are now in flower:

- Time (season) of flowering
- Size of plant: large, medium, small
- Leaves: length, width, tip shape, with/without variegation
- Umbel shape: round, semi-sphere, other
- Direction of flowers (upward, outwards) (cf. pendulous flowers in the other species, and pendulous or semi-pendulous in interspecifics)
- Peduncle or scape (flower stem): height
- Pedicels (stem supporting the individual flowers): long, short.

Various features of the individual flowers also deserve attention:

- Size of flower: large, medium, small
- Shape of flower: reflexed, tulip/cup-shaped, open, various others
- Shape of tepal (petal):
 - rounded, pointy
 - spaced-out (spider), overlapping (broad or round petals)
 - differences between shape of inner and outer tepals
 - additional tepals (from 7-12+) called polytepals (previously, multitepals)
 - ridges on tepals or not (keeled tepal)
- colour:
 - overall colour
 - throat: large, small, almost no throat of contrasting colour
 - combinations of colour, eg orange, white, cream/yellow, green
 - stripe along centre of flower, eg yellow, green
 - arrangements of colour, eg sharp contrast between throat and outer part, blurred or irregular boundary; picotee pattern with narrow band of colouring around edge, tips of petals with contrasting colour
 - differences between colour of inside and outside of tepals.

Note the less variation in colour in the cream/yellow coloured clivias in comparison with orange-coloured clivias.

Clivia groupings

In the Australian context, we are likely to come across a variety of names describing clivia on nursery labels or in catalogues. Some of the categories used nowadays often include smaller growing (sometimes with broader leaves) plants such as Belgium Hybrid, Dutch Hybrid, Daruma, Midget, Twins and others.

Specific cultivar names are also sometimes given, eg Clivia miniata 'Aurea'.

Notes from the Sowing Clivia Seeds demonstration

These notes have been prepared by Rae Begg and are a summary of Rae's demonstration on Sowing Clivia Seeds.

Good hygiene is a major factor to consider with your materials and equipment.

Condition of seeds:

- Still in berries..... seeds sterile/clean, sow immediately
- Dry seeds..... soak 1-2 hrs in 50% Seasol
- Contaminated/dirty seeds...... soak, shake occasionally, leave for 30 minutes in diluted White King (20ml White King + 80ml water). Do not rinse with water sow as is.

The longer the seeds are soaking, the higher the risk of fungal attack or drowning. Containers need to be clean. Wash used pots with hot soapy water. This is usually sufficient.

Propagation material:

- Is it clean?
- Is it likely to contain pathogens such as fungal spores or harmful bacteria?
- Will it attract unwanted organisms and flying insects such as the fungal gnat?

I prefer to use Brunnings sphagnum moss because:

- It is clean
- There are no soil particles which may contain pathogens
- You can easily see the presence of fungus
- There is no need to use fungicides
- It allows air circulation which keeps the moisture around the seeds without being soggy
- Seedlings will survive in this media for up to 6-8 months so if you don't get around to potting them up, they won't die
- It doesn't attract insects as long as it is not too wet
- It retains enough moisture so you don't need to water very often

I use small pots. The size depends on the number of seeds. Excess water can drain out after watering. It is preferable to encourage the roots to go down for better plant growth.

Don't over-water - seeds drown due to lack of air and turn brown

Don't use fertilizers - seedlings have enough food in the seed to last them until the seed drops off
