CULTIVATION NOTES Di Mathews

Spring has finally arrived after a long and cool winter, which has delayed flowering for many of us. It is an exciting time in the garden, and for *Clivia* growers, it can be very rewarding seeing new flowers resulting from crossings made in the distant past.

Clivia are very heavy feeders, so if you are not up to date with your fertilising, now is the time to do it. The quality and health of both flowers and leaves will be greatly improved with regular feeding. Pot grown plants are especially reliant on fertilisers as composted bark has little in the way of available nutrients.

New applications of slow release fertilisers are perfect if you have a lot of plants or are time poor. Growers with fewer plants may prefer to use a liquid fertiliser, but whichever type you use, ensure that it has a good amount of potassium in the mix. Young seedlings will respond very well to regular doses of half strength fertiliser, and older plants can be easily fed with a slow release type.

Plants are reliant on nitrogen for good leaf growth, phosphorus for good root growth, and potassium for strong stems. Ensure the fertilisers are also complete in the micro-nutrients to provide overall feeding for pot grown plants.

Fertiliser salts can also build up over time, so if you see a whitish crust on the bottom of the pots flush the pot with clean water to prevent damage to the roots from excess salts.

You may now water your plants with increasing frequency depending on the weather and their requirements, but still be careful not to over-water.

The new green growth is also a great enticement to chewing pests, so perform a regular inspection and do a regular spray with your pesticide of choice to prevent damage to young leaves.

The sun's rays are also getting much stronger, so positions for your pots that may have been suitable for winter may no longer give them sufficient protection in the warmer months. Observe how much protection your plants are receiving from the sun and move if necessary.

Lastly, enjoy your flowers that you have spent years cultivating. A *Clivia* in full bloom with a big head of flowers is a truly beautiful sight.
